Basics of Biochar: On-Farm Kiln and Soil Amendment Options

Thursday, December 8, 10:00 PM – 3:00 PM, Finnriver Farm and Cidery, 124 Center Road, Chimacum, WA

Charcoal, referred to as 'biochar' when applied in agricultural soils, has been shown to store carbon, retain nutrients and water, increase biological activity, and increase a plant's ability to absorb nutrients. New research on biochar's influence on soil carbon stabilization and increase in biological activity present an opportunity for charcoal to become a foundational element of regenerative agriculture, furthering other carbon-based farming practices. This FARMWALK will provide a summary of local and international research, as well as a series of on-farm and forestry production methods for converting woody debris into a resource that can increase crop resiliency in a changing climate.

Seed Growers, Black Leg disease, and the Quarantine Area on Whidbey Island

Monday, December 10, 3:00 PM - 5:00 PM, WSU Extension Island County, 406 N Main St. Coupeville

Seed production is an important business in Washington state, with approximately one-quarter of the world's cabbage seed produced in Western Washington. And a growing number of small farms are expanding into seed saving and small-scale, open-pollinated seed production.

Joining us in person are three respected individuals involved in issues of importance to local seed producers. **WSU Plant Pathologist Dr. Lindsay du Toit** will speak about Black Leg and Black Rot, two economically significant seedborne diseases that can affect Brassica vegetables, as well as related Brassica crops and weeds. **Don McMoran, Extension Director for Skagit County** will talk about non-brassica cover crop options for growers that can lessen the risk of disease spreading to seed crops. Also representing the WSDA Seed Inspection program will be Rich Gilbert to talk about the Crucifer Quarantine area that includes Whidbey Island north of Greenbank and how that impacts local vegetable growers, seed producers, and others who use crucifers and brassicas as cover or forage crops.

Friday - Saturday, January 18-19, South Puget Sound Community College, Olympia, WA



Optional field trips are on Friday, and Saturday includes a full day of programming: hands-on classes, tastings, panels, discussions, networking and locally-sourced meals.



Whidbey Island Weather Data


November Rainfall at Coupeville
