WSU research included in \$4.6 million awarded for Washington specialty crops

WSU bee researchers are among <u>25 recipients</u> of \$4.6 million in 2018 USDA Specialty Crop Block Grant funds awarded by WSDA for innovative projects to support the state's fruit, vegetable, and nursery industry through the federal Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (SCBG).

The PSA Grower Training Course is one way to satisfy the FSMA Produce Safety Rule requirement outlined in § 112.22(c) that requires 'At least one supervisor or responsible party for your farm must have successfully completed food safety training at least equivalent to that received under standardized curriculum recognized as adequate by the Food and Drug Administration.'



Participants will have the opportunity to ask questions and interact. It will be a full day of learning and networking!


