WSU Extension Island County SNAP-Ed Coordinator

The WSU Extension SNAP-Ed Coordinator is responsible for coordinating, implementing, and cultivating a school and community gardening education program for low income audiences. The work includes training; recruitment; program coordination; and continual monitoring, updating, and evaluation of the program. The Extension Coordinator collaborates with the SNAP-Ed Program Manager, the Island County Extension Director, other Extension staff and community partners to implement the program, and ensures that activities meet the requirements of the FNS Guidance for SNAP-Ed. With this funding source, WSU SNAP-Ed teaches youth and adults with limited incomes to develop skills and behaviors to eat healthfully. The position works independently to develop and support community partnership collaborations, and assists the Region 3 SNAP-Ed Program Manager with developing and monitoring budgets, and overseeing school and community garden staff personnel. This is a .75 FTE with benefits.




Whidbey Island Weather Data
