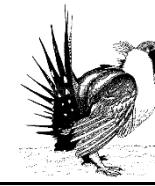


# WSU Conner Museum Bird Scavenger Hunt

Find an example of each of the following birds in the museum:



An ancestor of the domestic chicken: <b>Red Jungle Fowl</b>	The biggest woodpecker in the museum: <b>Pileated Woodpecker</b>	A duck with a green head and orange feet: <b>Mallard</b>	The woodpecker with the white head: <b>White-headed Woodpecker</b>	A nocturnal (night-time) bird that makes very little noise when it flies: <b>Any owl</b>
Two solid black birds in the same display case that look nearly identical except for size: <b>Crow and Raven</b>	The eagle that occurs in Washington and usually nests on high cliffs: <b>Golden Eagle</b>	The bird that White-barked Pines depend on to plant its seeds: <b>Clark's Nutcracker</b>	A pink bird with very long legs: <b>Flamingo</b>	A nearly all red-colored bird and a nearly all blue-colored bird in the same case: <b>Northern Cardinal</b> <b>Mountain Bluebird</b>
A bird with a slender, pointed beak used to "glean" insects (pick them off surfaces such as plant foliage): <b>Warblers, wrens, etc.</b>	A bird with a long beak that probes mud for insects and crustaceans: <b>Dowitcher, Dunlin, Curlew, many other shorebirds</b>	A bird with webbed feet: <b>Many, including waterfowl, loons, grebes</b>	A bird that lays really big eggs and has the same name as a fruit: <b>Kiwi</b>	A bird that specializes in eating shellfish: <b>Oystercatcher</b>
A bird with a chick on its back: <b>Red-necked Grebe and Eared Grebe</b>	The bird with the longest, most spectacular tail feathers in the museum: <b>Peacock</b>	A bird with sexual dimorphism "reversal", in which the brightly-colored female lays eggs, then leaves the drabber-colored male to raise the chicks by himself: <b>Wilson's Phalarope (true of any phalarope)</b>	The biggest white bird in the museum: <b>Trumpeter Swan, but White Pelican would be an okay answer. It may not be obvious which is larger or that White Pelicans have black-edged wings.</b>	A bird with migrates 40,000 miles every year in a big figure 8 in the Pacific Ocean: <b>Sooty Shearwater</b>
A DUCK that can dive 200 feet under water <b>Long-tailed Duck</b>	A bird found year-round in the alpine zone in Washington State: <b>White-tailed Ptarmigan</b>	A bird with turquoise-colored eyebrows found in Mexico: <b>Turquoise-browed Motmot</b>	A Buteo (a kind of hawk) that breeds in the arctic and occurs in Washington only in winter: <b>Rough-legged Hawk</b>	The smallest owl in North America: <b>Northern Pygmy Owl</b>
