As a responsible 4-H member, it's key to keep your livestock and pets comfortable during the summer heat!

>>> LIVESTOCK

Water

Provide clean and fresh water at all times.
 Animals will drink more water under extreme heat conditions, so make sure you consider that. If you have automatic waterers or float valves on tanks, check to make sure they are functioning properly. Also, make sure there is easy access for all your animals. If you have a large herd, you may need to consider adding more troughs so that animals do not have to wait or fight for access to a water tank.

Shelter

 This can be from trees, a barn, or any other structure that provides shade from the sun.
 Animals can get sunburned like people can.
 Pink skin is at a higher risk of getting burned.
 Providing shade can help prevent sunburn.
 Sunscreen can be applied to pink markings on horses, but be careful to avoid the eyes.

It is important to consider your animal's individual heat tolerance. Animals with dark or black fur and hide are at a higher risk of heat stress. It is also important to minimize exercise and stress during extreme heat.

Overheated animals can be cooled by hosing them down with cool water. If your animal shows extreme heat stress, contact your vet immediately.

>>> PETS

Know your Pets

 Pets tolerate heat differently based on their breed, coat, health, and body fat. Senior pets and those with diseases may not regulate their temperature well, making them vulnerable to heat stress.

Bring them Inside

- All animals are susceptible to heat stress, especially if left outside in extreme heat for long periods.
- Bring them inside or provide shade, shelter, and good air circulation. Make sure they have unlimited, fresh water.

Outdoor Dangers

- Never leave your pet unattended in a car when it is warm outside! Even with the windows cracked, temperatures can quickly rise to dangerous levels.
- Shortening and scheduling walk times in the morning or late evening can help avoid overheating during exercise.
- Remember, paws can get burnt on hot pavement, causing discomfort. If possible, consider using goodfitting booties or walking on grass surfaces.
- Make sure your yard and garden have pet-safe plants.

Watchful Eye

- Watch for signs of heat stress and seek veterinary care if you notice any of these signs:
 - unsteady and/or collapse
 - abnormal gum /tongue color
 - excessive panting
 - excessive drooling

Following these tips can keep your four-legged friend safe and cool during the summer heat.
