FAIR HISTORY 101

4-H AND FAIR

The 4-H Program and county fairs have been inextricably linked since the early 1900's. In most cases 4-H does not coordinate the fair itself, but 4-H professionals do work closely all year with other extension staff, county officials, fair board members, and fairground management to plan and bring about the annual county and state fairs that showcase the area's finest resources.

While any member of the general public can exhibit at their county fair, only enrolled 4-H youth members can enter exhibits and contests in 4-H categories. (Division 20 at NCW Fair, Department 800 at Chelan County Fair.) Only members of youth organizations such as 4-H, FFA, or Grange may sell project animals at the fair livestock auctions or participate in special activities such as Knowledge Bowl, Cooking Contests, and the Style Show. Additional rules and requirements apply to 4-H exhibits and members than the general public, and greater importance is placed on the educational component of projects.


Exhibiting at fair is not required in 4-H - positive development and education are the primary goals. However, fair is a prime opportunity to showcase all you have learned and accomplished during the 4-H year, and we encourage all enrolled 4-H members to participate!

DID YOU KNOW?



CHELAN & DOUGLAS COUNTY FAIRS

4-H Members in Chelan & Douglas Counties are encouraged to participate in either/both local county fairs. The Douglas County Fair is the NCW Fair, held in Waterville August 21-24. The Chelan County Fair takes place in Cashmere from September 4-7. Earning a blue ribbon from either fair can qualify a member to participate in the WA State 4-H Fair in Puyallup (Aug 29-Sept 21). Rules for exhibiting differ between fairs, so be sure to read the rules concerning your exhibits in the fair's Exhibitor Guide:

EXHIBITING 4-H PROJECTS

4-H Members may only enter contests and exhibits for projects in which they are enrolled on 4honline.com. For example, to enter cookies in any fair, you must be enrolled in a foods project; to enter a craft item, you must be enrolled in creative arts.

The final day to make adjustments to 4-H project enrollments on www.4honline.com is Thursday, July 31.

4-H AGE CATEGORIES

For all 4-H activities, members are grouped by age, as of the first day of the current 4-H year, **October 1, 2024**:

- Cloverbuds - ages 5-7
- Juniors - ages 8-10
- Intermediates - ages 11-13
- Seniors - ages 14-18

CLOVERBUDS

Cloverbud 4-H members, ages 5-7, are encouraged to participate in the fair, but all participation is *non-competitive*.

Cloverbuds may not participate in large animal projects, food preservation, shooting sports, or sell in the animal auctions.

Cloverbuds receive participation ribbons and blue ribbon premium points for all contests.

EXHIBITOR NUMBER

At each fair, every individual exhibitor will receive one (**and ONLY one**) Exhibitor Number. This unique number identifies you as the exhibitor for every item or contest you enter, no matter what department, class, lot, barn, youth organization, etc. For example, if you enter a steer project with 4-H and also a gardening project in Open Class, your Exhibitor Number is the same for both. Please make sure that your Exhibitor Number is written *legibly and correctly* on every Exhibit Tag in each location where requested. This is your unique ID throughout the entire fair and is very important in calculating and distributing your premium points and awards during and after fair.

JUDGING AND AWARDS

Every contest at the fair has a judging and awards process associated with it. In nearly all 4-H contests, the Danish System is used, which means that each exhibit is judged against an established standard rather than against the other exhibits. In the Danish system, an entry earning a score of 90-100 receives a blue ribbon, 80-89 receives a red, and 79 or below receives a white. In some departments/classes, a Grand Champion and Reserve Champion may be awarded at the judges' discretion. These distinguish certain exhibits as "the best of the best", and are typically not awarded until there are at least 5 entries in the same department/class.

JUDGING STANDARDS

Judging Scoresheets for every class/department are available to see how specific projects will be judged. PREMIUM POINTS

Premium points are earned each time an exhibit earns a ribbon or award. The premium point value for each contest is different. For example, gardening project premium points might be 70/50/30 for blue/red/white ribbons, while participation in the Style Show might be 50/40/30 for blue/red/white ribbons, with an additional 50/25 available for winners of Grand/Reserve Champion Awards. Premium point checks are mailed from the fair to exhibitors within about 60 days after fair. Typically checks under \$5 will not be printed unless special arrangements are made with the fair office.

An exhibitor number will be assigned to you; use your unique Exhibitor Number for **all entries**.

- Animal Exhibits: Must be registered online by July 15.
- Still Life Exhibits: Register online through August 10, or in-person on entry days below
- Style Show/Clothing Contests: Register through 4-H Office by August 15

Entry Days:

- August 16, 2-6pm: All NON-PERISHABLES
- August 20, 1-8pm: All perishables & animals

Exhibitor Ticket for Admission:

- It is free to exhibit at the fair. However, if you would like to ATTEND the fair (*required for animal exhibitors*) you may purchase an Exhibitor Ticket for the discounted price of \$10 (students) or \$12 (adults) which allows regular fair entry on all days. This is half the price of a regular Season Pass!
- Exhibitor Tickets purchased with exhibit registration online will be mailed to you.
- Exhibitor Tickets do not include admission to special events such as concerts or rodeos

4-H Exhibitors register as a club, so let your club leaders know if you want to exhibit! 4-H Club leaders must submit Exhibitor Pass Lists and Stall/Pen Reservation Forms (if applicable) to the Fair Office by July 31. Exhibitor numbers will be assigned based on these lists; use your unique exhibitor number for *all entries* whether animal or still-life.

- Market Animals: Club Leader must submit a list of market animals to CCF Livestock Committee by May 31 to receive an ear tag for auction.
- All Animal Exhibits: Register by submitting 4-H Club Exhibitor Pass List and Stall/Pen Reservation Form by July 31. *In August, members will be asked to provide more details about their animals to build Class Lists.*
- Still Life Exhibits: Club Leaders are encouraged to submit all still-life exhibitors on their club's Exhibitor Pass List by July 31 so that exhibit numbers and gate passes can be distributed ahead of Entry Day. Limited still-life exhibit registration and Exhibitor Pass purchase is available in-person on entry day ONLY.
- Style Show/Clothing Contests: Register through 4-H Office by August 15.

Entry Day:

- September 3, 12-8pm: All Exhibits

Exhibitor Ticket for Admission

- It is free to exhibit. However, if you would like to ATTEND the fair (*required for animal exhibitors*) you may purchase an Exhibitor Ticket for the price of \$10 (youth) \$20 (adult), less than half the price of a Season Pass!
- Exhibitor Tickets may be pre-ordered with pre-registration paperwork due to Fair Office July 31, or purchased in-person on entry day ONLY.

DEMONSTRATIONS

We encourage ALL youth members to give a demonstration (aka "Demo") at fair. No pre-qualifier is required to do your Demo at a County Fair, and earning a Blue Ribbon makes you eligible to give your Demo at the WA State Fair in Puyallup! Sign-up in the 4-H Building when you arrive at the fair, or contact the 4-H Office now to claim your spot ahead of time. Demo times are available as follows*:

- Thursday: 4-6pm
- Friday: 4-6pm
- Saturday: 1-4pm
- Sunday: 12-2pm



Would you like to see what judges are looking for in a Blue Ribbon Demo? Familiarize yourself with the Demo Score Sheet to deliver a demonstration to impress any judge!

*Additional times may be added if necessary.

KNOWLEDGE BOWL

Knowledge Bowl is an activity that showcases 4-H members' knowledge on various 4-H Project areas through written, multiple-choice tests. You do not have to be enrolled in a project to take the quiz for that subject. Ribbons and premium points are awarded for each individual test.

Pre-registration not required.


- At NCW Fair, only rabbit Knowledge Bowl is available; ask the rabbit superintendent for details.
- At the Chelan County Fair, knowledge bowl tests for numerous projects from swine to sewing are available in the 4-H building during all open hours.




RECORD BOOKS

EDUCATIONAL POSTERS



Educational Posters are a stand-alone educational exhibit that can focus on any topic relating to your 4-H project and should

be designed to educate members of the public about the topic without any other explanation from the exhibitor.

Using an Educational Poster as a visual aid for your Demonstration is discouraged. Why?...

- A great Educational Poster does all the teaching and explaining by itself as a *stand-alone piece*,
- A visual aid for a Demo should be simple, such as a prop, photo, or bulleted list, to help illustrate the points of a verbal presentation, but would not educate the public on its own.
- Ed.Posters are also different than Barn Decor, see *Stall Decor* on pg. 9

REQUIRED!

HOSTING SHIFTS IN 4-H BUILDING

All 4-H Clubs attending fair must serve one shift as building helpers/hosts in the 4-H Building*. Responsibilities include welcoming the public, answering questions, ensuring the exhibits are safe, clean, and presentable, and representing the 4-H program to all who visit. We ask that at least 2 people be present at all times during the assigned shift and that members are always supervised by an adult.

**Members with animals must also sign up for Barn Duty for each species they are exhibiting. More info on the following page...*



Your entire club does not need to be present at the same time. Ideally, groups of 2-3 kids and 1-2 adults are providing coverage at any given time.

HEAT SAFETY

FOR PEOPLE

It's crucial that everyone take personal measures to protect themselves from heat stress. Heat stress symptoms in people can include dizziness, headache, fatigue, cramping, or nausea. If left unattended, heat stress can quickly progress into heat exhaustion or even heat stroke. Pay attention to your body on hot days. Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of water, juice, or sports drinks even if you don't feel thirsty. Wear light clothing, wear sunscreen, and limit your time spent in direct sun/heat. Place cold rags on your neck, wrists, or the front of your elbows.

FOR ANIMALS

It's very important to monitor the health of your animal in the heat. The effects of prolonged exposure to high temperature can cause severe illness or even death for animals. In animals, signs of heat stress might be drooling, panting, lethargy, or decreased feed intake.

- Make sure your animal has access to cool, fresh water at all times.
- Minimize the time they are in direct sunlight.
- Utilize fans to circulate the air around animal enclosures where appropriate.
- For small animals, freeze water bottles and place them inside the enclosures; many animals enjoy laying against the cold surface.
- When possible, avoid handling your animals in the heat of the day.
- If you are concerned about the health of your animal, notify a responsible adult immediately for assistance.



FITTING & SHOWING

You must fit and show one animal of each type you bring to Fair; for instance, one rabbit and one chicken. All work preparing the animal for fitting and showing must be done **by the exhibitor**, not a parent!



Members exhibiting animals must sign up for Barn Duty* for each animal project area they are exhibiting at the fair. Sign-ups are handled by each individual Barn Superintendent, and shift time and duration will be determined by the number of total exhibitors. Find your barn superintendent upon check-in for more details and to sign up.

**Barn Duty is IN ADDITION to serving as Building Hosts with your club in the 4-H Building for one shift. (pg. 7)*

BARN HERDSMANSHIP

4-H members exhibiting animals will be judged on Barn Herdsmanship at both fairs. Proper Barn Herdsmanship means that exhibitors properly care for their animals, pens & equipment, keep them safe, and keep the animals and surrounding areas clean and attractive at all times.

Herdsmanship also takes into account the stall decorations and educational elements displayed in the animal enclosure.

Some criteria for judging include:

- Is the animal clean and groomed?
- Does the animal have water?
- Is the bedding & enclosure clean?
- Are tack and equipment put away?
- Are the animal, exhibitor, and club properly identified?
- Are displays and decor neatly maintained?

STALL DECORATIONS

Stall decorations are an important part of making the animal barns inviting and educational. The decor in your animal enclosure is also taken into account by the judges in scoring your Barn Herdsmanship. Exhibitors may begin decorating stalls/pens at the following times unless directed otherwise by Barn Superintendents:

- NCW Fair: Saturday, August 16 at 8am
- Chelan County: Tuesday, September 3 at 2pm

All stall decorations must be completed prior to judging on Thursday. Barn decorations should reflect the theme for the current year fair. Barn decorations and equipment cannot be removed from animal exhibit areas until the fair closes on Sunday.



MARKET LIVESTOCK QUALITY ASSURANCE FORMS

Producer Affidavit/Market Livestock Quality Assurance forms for market Beef, Sheep, Swine and Meat Goats must be complete and ready to submit at weigh-in.

STILL LIFE ENTRY

While animal registrations are due to each fairgrounds in July, still life entries can be submitted right up until Entry Day! So if you have any projects you'd like to enter, just ensure that you're enrolled through 4-H in the corresponding project category (www.4honline.com) by July 31.

- For NCW Fair, register entries online at FairEntry.com by August 10, or register it in person when you bring it to fair! (non perishables Aug. 16, perishables Aug. 20)
- For Chelan County Fair, come to entry day prepared to fill out exhibit tags on September 3.


FOOD PRESERVATION EXHIBITS



Food Preservation exhibits must be canned according to USDA and WSU recommendations in order to be judged and given a ribbon at the Fair. Jam, jelly, and pickle products do not have to be made from Extension recipes, but jerkies do. Contact the Extension Office for specific recipes, as improperly prepared jerky can cause illness. Any canned food entered without a canning label or with incorrect information can suggest a safety problem and will not be judged. Labels are available from Extension offices prior to Fair.



CLOTHING CONTESTS



For those enrolled in clothing, knitting, and crocheting projects, there are several activities and contests in which to participate at fair. These activities require preregistration by August 15.

- **Clothing Contest:** sew an item at the fair in under 2 hours!
- **Creative Consumers of Fashion:** style an outfit to show off your clothing and textile knowledge!
- **Style Show, Sunday, 3pm:** Strut your stuff on stage to showcase clothing or accessories you made as a 4-H Project!

Registration is required for those participating in the clothing contests, Style Show, and the Creative Consumers of Fashion Contest.

EXHIBIT, EXHIBIT, EXHIBIT!

Looking to enter more projects in the fair?

- Enroll in the 4-H Craft Project to enter things like: art/painting/drawing, jewelry, candles, scratch art, Lego projects, leather projects, etc.
- Enroll in the 4-H Gardening Project to enter things like: carrots, corn, cucumbers, tomatoes, gourds, squash, sunflowers, watermelon, blackberries, raspberries, container garden (floral or garden), flowers, fairy gardens, weeds, flower arrangements, etc.





DRESS FOR THE OCCASION!

While you are at Fair, you are representing the 4-H program - not only in Chelan/Douglas County, but the nationwide program! Be sure your clothing and manners represent 4-H in a positive manner. Certain classes such as equine, livestock, and small animal projects have specific dress code requirements:

Attire NOT allowed:

- Any attire with holes or rips
- Sagging pants or pants worn significantly below the waist
- Revealing pants or pants with side openings, mesh, or cutouts
- Mesh or see through garments
- Visible midriff or inappropriately visible cleavage; neckline of top should remain in place when bending over
- Halter top, tube top, one shoulder top, backless top, or spaghetti strap top
- Visible undergarments
- Attire with poorly placed logos or inappropriate logos

4-H Beef, Swine, Sheep, Goat, Rabbit, Cavy, & Poultry Classes

- Shirts, must be tucked in:
 - **Fitting & Showing/Showmanship Classes:** long-sleeved shirts required; white shirts are recommended
 - **Breed Classes, Judging Classes, & Barn Duty:** Club T-Shirts or long-sleeved shirts; white recommended
- Jeans or slacks required, black recommended; no shorts
- Boots required; no tennis shoes, sandals, open-toe or open-heel shoes allowed
- No hats allowed
- Ties are optional

4-H Horse Classes

- ASTM/SEI approved headgear must be worn when mounted/driving, must be properly fitted and have the chin strap fastened. It is recommended that 4-H members wear their ASTM/SEI helmets anytime they are around their horses.
- Boots required; must fit flat in the stirrup with the ball of the foot on the flat iron or stirrup and must be able to move freely in the stirrup with the ability to slide out. Heel must have an adequate heel stop to prevent forward movement through the stirrup.
- Pants must be jeans, trousers, or western pants: black pants are recommended

CHARACTER COUNTS

4-H is part of the nationwide "Character Counts! Coalition" that has committed itself to teaching the six pillars of character identified by the Josephson Institute of Ethics.

TAKE THESE PILLARS OF CHARACTER WITH YOU TO FAIR!

PILLARS OF CHARACTER

- **Trustworthiness** - keep your commitments; do your own work; speak positively about the 4-H program
- **Respect** - Take proper care of your animals; listen to judges, parents, superintendents, and leaders
- **Responsibility** - Take care of animals & equipment; always do your best; never give up.
- **Fairness** - Accept winning or losing gracefully; follow the standards for your project; abide by the rules
- **Caring** - Encourage fellow 4-H members; treat your animal humanely; offer to help someone
- **Citizenship** - Accept instructions; win/lose) with grace; teach younger members; make sure your market animal is safe for consumption.

VOLUNTEER!



Many hands make light work, and there's so much work to be done at fair! Volunteering in an official capacity can be a great way to secure a free or reduced-price ticket for those planning to attend fair with their children. For all days of fair, 4-H needs volunteers to assist with judging, barn hosting, barn herdsmanship, clerking, and more. No special knowledge is needed for most roles!

- NCW Fair: Sign up with the 4-H Office for details on discounted/free entry tickets for volunteers.
- Chelan County Fair: Volunteers working less than 4 hours can purchase a discounted ticket for \$5/day or \$10/season pass. Volunteer 4+ hours to receive a free day pass!
