SUBJECT: UCORE Changes approved by the UCORE Committee – Bulletin No. 2

The courses listed below reflect the status of UCORE renewals as approved by the UCORE Committee during the 2023/24 academic year. This bulletin includes both courses whose department requested to add or drop their UCORE status; as well as courses which were approved to renew their UCORE status for another period of five years. All courses whose UCORE status is being dropped are printed in their entirety under the headings *Current* and *Proposed*. The course information under the heading titled *Current* will show strikethroughs for removal of the UCORE attribute; the heading titled *Proposed* will show how the courses are to be displayed in the next catalog edition. The column to the far right indicates the date each change becomes effective. No changes are being made to the courses whose UCORE status is to be renewed, and they are listed at bottom.
